

Did You Know?

Should a person hear that a couple "tied the knot," it's immediately known that they got married. But just when and where does the term "tying the knot" come from? The phrase "tying the knot" is steeped in tradition, though the origins of the phrase remain open for debate. One origin story states that tying the knot can be traced back to the Roman empire, when brides wore girdles that were tied in knots, and the groom had to eventually until those knots to consummate the marriage. Tying the knot also may be traced to the custom of handfasting. The marriage contract was established between a bride and a groom by joining their hands together and tying them. Although accounts vary as to whether the hands were tied only during the ceremony or later, this is believed to be an ancient Renaissance or Celtic tradition. Others speculate that the phrase traces its origins to Hindu weddings in which brides and grooms tied a necklace of flowers as part of wedding tradition. Yet another theory suggests that the phrase can be traced back to the knotted string that supported beds prior to the use of metal springs. Therefore, in order to make a marriage bed, couples first needed to tie the knot. Knots

also represent a difficult-to-break bond, which is why they have long been associated with marriage. In one unity tradition, couples may braid or knot together three strands, with one representing the bride, one symbolizing the groom and the third representing God as they join together in faith. Similarly, the phrase "getting hitched" is associated with knot-tying as well. The saying implies that two people are being tied together just like a horse is tied, or hitched, to a wagon.

environmentalist ethos when planning their weddings by doing everything they can to eliminate waste and promote conservation. Send electronic invitations and save-the-date cards in lieu of paper alternatives and choose a reception venue that serves only locally sourced food and beverages. In lieu of wedding favors, which tend to be individually wrapped, make a donation in guests' names to a local environmental group and share that information with loved ones. When picking a hotel for guests, find lodging that incorporates sustainability into its day-to-day operations.

 Retire certain traditions. Couples need not feel pressured to incorporate traditions that no longer reflect modern sensibilities. It's up to couples to determine which traditions to retire, but customs like the garter toss and bouquet toss may no longer resonate with modern couples or their guests. In addition, brides who want to be walked down the aisle by both of their

- parents, as opposed to just their father, should not hesitate to do so.
- Look for a modern venue. One of the most awe-inspiring ways to give a wedding a modern touch is to choose a venue that reflects a modern aesthetic. Vaulted ceilings, white walls and floor-to-ceiling windows can create a clean, modern feel. Outdoor ceremonies also can create a modern ambiance.
- Adjust your attire. Black tuxedos and white wedding dresses are among the first things to come to mind when imagining traditional weddings. Couples can stay formal but embrace a more modern look by choosing more colorful tuxes for grooms and groomsmen and picking a wedding gown with a flair of color. Brides also can allow bridesmaids to pick their own bridesmaid dresses to expand the modern look even further.

There's no shortage of ways for couples to give their weddings a modern touch.

Ultimate Wedding Planner

One Year Before

- __ Work out your budget.
- __ Start shopping for wedding rings.
- Prepare your guest list to determine the size of your wedding.
- __ Select your bridal party and wedding day assistant.
- __ Decide on a ceremony site.
- __ Reserve your officiant.
- _ Search for a reception location and secure your date with a deposit.
- __ Choose a caterer if one is not available at your reception location.
- __ Decide where to book your rehearsal dinner.
- _ Check with your officiant's schedule for the rehearsal dinner.
- _ Shop for your dress. It can take several months for your dress to arrive.
- __ After you've found your dress, schedule your fittings.
- __ Select bridesmaids' gowns.
- Start the search for your wedding vendors.
- __ Speak to a travel agent about honeymoon destinations.

9 Months Before

- __ Start finalizing the guest list and addresses.
- __ Choose a Bridal Registry and register for gifts.
- Select and order groom's and attendants' attire. Schedule fittings and pickup or delivery date.
- __ Finalize all wedding vendors and put down deposits.
- __ Finalize the plans for your honeymoon.
- __ Schedule your engagement photos.

- Submit your engagement announcement to the Grant, lowa, Lafayette Shopping News.
- __ Select and order your invitations.

6 Months Before

- __ Meet with your florist and choose floral arrangements.
- __ Meet with all your wedding vendors to finalize orders.
- __ Order your wedding cake.
- Begin doing your research for your marriage license.

4 Months Before

- __ Reserve accommodations for out-of-town guests.
- Send out your invitations. Include information on the accommodations.
- __ Arrange final dress fittings.
- Purchase wedding guest book.
- Order your wedding favors, bridal party gifts and other wedding accessories.

2 Months Before

- Make appointment with your beautician for wedding day hair styles for you and your bridal party.
- ___ Make appointments for you and your bridal party to get manicures, pedicures, massages, etc.
- __ Choose a make-up artist and schedule a trial.
- Schedule a trial.

 Start gathering your RSVPs.
- __ Finalize your dates for your final dress fittings.

1 Month Before

- __ Finalize and confirm all ceremony & reception plans. Finalize rehearsal dinner
- __ Finalize rehearsal dinner details.
- _ Go over song lists and requests with your band or DJ.

- __ Give your photographer a "must-have list".
- _ Confirm when final payments need to be made to vendors.
- __ Draw up seating arrangements for the reception.
- __ Have a trial session with the hairstylists and make-up artists.
- __ Get your marriage license.

2-3 Weeks Before

- __ Pick up wedding rings.
- Confirm arrival times with vendors.
- Confirm hotel arrangements for guests.
- _ Have your final dress fitting.

1 Week Before

- __ Give the caterer your final guest count.
- Have final fittings for groom and groomsmen.
- __ Make arrangements for your wedding gifts to be brought home.

1-2 Days Before

- Get a manicure and pedicure.
- __ Make payment envelopes for each vendor for your wedding day assistant to take care of.
- Compile a list of all your wedding vendors with phone numbers for your wedding day assistant.
- __ Host your rehearsal dinner.
- __ Give gifts to your wedding party, family and fiancé at the rehearsal dinner.

Your Wedding Day

- __ Get your hair and make-up done.
- __ Make sure you eat and drink a lot of water.
- __ Relax and enjoy yourself!
